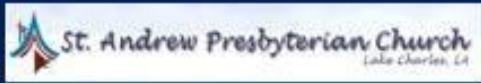

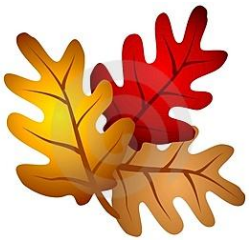

Pastor's Ponderings

Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Matthew 16:24. "Astonishingly, Jesus offers crucifixion to those who would follow him. In a bold assertion of God's boundary-crossing grace, Jesus takes as his logo the grim killing tool of the world's superpower: 'Take up [your] cross' (v. 24). If you want to follow me, deny yourself; if you want to find your life, give up your life. Jesus dies in our place, but not to exempt us from the cost of discipleship." *Feasting on the Word*, Year A, Vol 4, p.24.

What does this mean to us today? How can we take up our crosses and follow Jesus? So often we seem to view the world through our own lens and we interpret everything according to "me." This seems contrary to this idea of finding our lives through giving up our lives. So often we hear of "taking up our cross" as being willing to suffer to "offer this up" to Jesus. How do we reconcile this with the idea that God wants to love us and bless us? Is suffering evidence of faithfulness?

Undoubtedly, our lives will be full of challenges as a consequence of our sinfulness. Yet, God's love is absolute. We do not suffer because we are disciples, yet when we suffer pain, illness, or persecution, we may offer this as a sacrifice because we always know that around the next bend lies the resurrection, when redemption is complete. The answer may lie in looking outside ourselves and being willing to do whatever it takes to live as faithful disciples, knowing that God's promise of redemption is true.

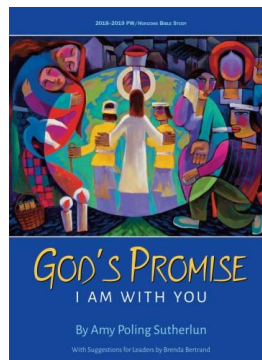

The 2018—2019 PW/*Horizons* Bible study, *God's Promise: I Am with You*, takes readers on a journey through scripture to consider circumstances in which God articulated God's promise of presence. This study does not delve deeply into manifestations of God's presence but rather on God's actual articulation of God's promise. We will see anew that God offered these words of profound comfort and commitment to individuals and communities from the time of the patriarchs to that of the prophets; from the judges to the kings; before, during, and after the exile; into the New Testament and beyond, to the end of the age.

2018 Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering



Since 1888, Presbyterian women have joyfully expressed gratitude for God's blessings by sharing their blessings with those in need at home and around the world. The Thank Offering funds programs that provide education, safe housing, clean water, health care, help for prisoners, justice for women, and so much more.

In March 2018, the Creative Ministries Offering Committee of Presbyterian Women met to review 83 applications submitted for grants from the 2017 Thank Offering. Sixteen of the projects were chosen for funding. Twelve of the projects are ministries serving people in need in the United States. Four of the projects are international. More than 40 percent of the projects funded are health ministries. A few of the ministries are listed below for 2018.

SYNOD OF THE ROCKY MOUNTAINS, Denver Presbytery, Good Neighbor Garage, Hands of the Carpenter, Golden, Colorado

The Good Neighbor Garage (GNG) supports the transportation needs of low-/fixed-income single mothers and widows. Donated cars are repaired and provided to women who do not have a reliable car. To receive a car, women must prove they live on a fixed income and that they can afford licensing, insurance, gas and maintenance. GNG provides maintenance services and holds clinics on car care and ongoing car maintenance. Women are employed as mechanics and serve on the board.

SYNOD OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA AND HAWAII Presbytery of Santa Barbara, Shower the People, Arroyo Grande, California

Shower the People will provide access to mobile showers for people who are homeless in South San Luis Obispo County. Seventy-nine percent of South County's homeless live on the street, in encampment areas, in cars and in abandoned buildings. There are no shower facilities available for these individuals. Access to showers promotes a sense of dignity and self-esteem for the individual, as well as conferring the health benefits of cleanliness. This grant will provide funds to purchase the mobile shower unit/transport vehicle and to initiate services.

SYNOD OF LIVING WATERS, Transylvania Presbytery, Finding Freedom Through Friendship—Expansion into Egypt, Outskirts of Cairo (Garbage City), Egypt

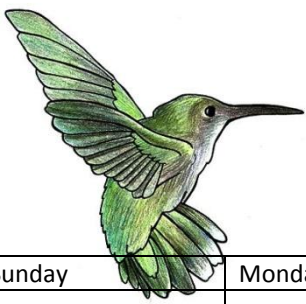
This program is a health program that seeks to provide hope, dignity and security to women who are the heads of household of destitute families. Health and nutrition education are the primary foci of this grant. The Peace & Global Witness Offering: Domestic Violence Awareness
A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The

remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.


